Dear Friends,

Best wishes to you for a healthy and happy year ahead. 2024 is the third year of the triennial and is a time of reflection and planning for the future for your trustees. Mothers' Union is a wonderful charity and the value we can deliver to local communities relies on each and every one of you to contribute in prayer and in the skills and time that you bring to our projects.

In the 2022 Spring edition of Focus I began the *Dear Friends* letter with a quote from Justin Welby Archbishop of Canterbury: 'Mothers' Union are the heart and love of the church'.

However, we are sometimes known as the church's greatest secret too. To improve the awareness of Mothers' Union, all members are encouraged to speak out about Mothers' Union and we would like to encourage you to consider giving the MU Oxford Gift of Association to a friend or relative. For one year the recipient will find out about Mothers' Union and may decide to take up membership themselves.

And to raise awareness in the wider church, three trustees will be attending the Oxford diocesan synod at the beginning of March to give a short presentation to delegates about the work of the Mothers' Union in Oxford diocese.

Also, in 2022, trustee Jenny Searle wrote that the trustee board would focus on three things:

- to simplify aspects of our organisation;
- to raise the profile of Mothers' Union within the church and local communities where we live;
- to increase fundraising from outside our membership.

eNews, read by over half of our members monthly, is providing news and keeping members who have access to the internet up to date. Eve, MU membership secretary, has also been working on a new website which will be easier to navigate and will grab the attention of our members and the wider community.

I would like to thank Rachel Buckley who for a long time has done a wonderful job keeping on top of the more cumbersome current website.

Mothers' Union Oxford magazine Focus will be issued twice in 2024 and a copy will be posted to all members in spring and autumn.

Please continue to send in your contributions and pictures, and make sure your branch enters the noticeboard challenge (see page 10) - an eye-catching way to highlight Mothers' Union projects and inform members of the public of the contribution we make and how we do touch lives. Trustees would also like to encourage more applications for AFIA holidays. Please advertise what we offer; details are on the website.

Fundraising from outside our membership may be seen as more of a challenge. Branch correspondents and diocesan members will have received a poster produced by Rev. Lady Denise Brown. Please pin it up

to show the wider community what we do. Perhaps you could:

- organise a special service in church using MU resources with a collection for Mothers' Union;
- provide a cream tea or similar for members of the congregation to raise funds for AFIA:
- invite the wider church community to buy MUe cards;
- contribute coffee for Ronald McDonald House,
- knit goods for Baby Basics and Children Heard and Seen.

Resources and ideas are on the Oxford MU website. Together we can make Mothers' Union relevant and visible in today's world in 2024.

Just a thought....

It is said that there is a book inside every one of us and so there is — the story of your life. Unique. Special to you. Have you ever wanted to write it down, or at least part of it? I hope to encourage some of you to do just that.

Why do we want to tell others about the life we have lived? Part of the reason may be, as the advert tells us "because you're worth it". We are all worth it, certainly in God's eyes if not in our own. Your story is a one-off. You may not think it very interesting but others may not agree. Your story is a social history. For instance, you may have memories of the war.

You may have grandchildren who wonder about your life when you were young. I wonder about my grandparents. My Dad was one of fourteen. The weekly grind began with the washing (in the 'copper') on Mondays and Grandma said she was lucky if it took only one day. Grandad was disabled and had to retire early. She lived to be 91. They were tough in those days!

My mother was the eldest of ten. Her father was never out of work and his children always had shoes, so they were able to attend school. I can remember him sitting at the kitchen table, repairing shoes on a last. When he brought home his wages on a Friday evening, Grandma set aside the rent and the insurance before allocating money for food and heating. The bills were always paid.

That is another reason to write your story: to honour those who have gone before us, whose DNA we share. You may like to write your story for sheer enjoyment of your memories. Or maybe you wish to exorcise some of your ghosts or share insights with readers. Another reason will be to give thanks to our father God for taking us along the way we have walked, for being with us, for the happy memories and experiences, perhaps seeing other parts of the world.

If you are moved to take up pen and paper or to sit at your computer or laptop, then go for it! You can start at any time in your life, following a timeline or moving backwards and forwards. Write as memories come to you — you can always tidy up the order later on. You may want to start with a prologue, something that interests your readers and makes them want to read on. Above all, be frank and honest.

So, have a go! There is no need to be anxious about editing and publishing until you have something to edit and publish! I shall be glad to help if you have any fears or questions.

Barbara Teague

When Barbara and her family moved to Arborfield in 1962, one of her first concerns was to find a church. Arborfield parish church had a small gathering of 'mums' and other younger ladies which flourished as the Young Wives Group. Barbara joined and found that the group was loosely affiliated to the Mothers' Union. Before long Barbara was attending MU meetings representative Oxford as Arborfield. As the young wives matured the group became Mothers' Union branch, Barbara's love and enthusiasm for the work of Mothers' Union was second to none.

In 1983 Barbara was asked if she would take on the post of Diocesan Treasurer, a post she held until 1993. In 1994 she was elected Diocesan President, and she held that position until 1999.

The post of Diocesan President

is a demanding one as each of the local branches (about 200 over three counties) has a right to ask the DP to listen to and solve their problems.



She never counted how many branches she visited but there were very few times when she had to say "sorry, I can't make that date". There were also demands made by Mary Sumner House to attend central meetings, take up central roles and to be 'available' to other organisations for MU co-operation.

After she ceased to be Diocesan President Barbara still attended local branch meetings, central AGMs, Lady Day services and some speaking engagements. Her local branch closed, and she joined Wokingham All Saints' branch, but found regular attendance almost impossible. She had a minor seizure in 2018 and a recurrence in late 2022 which developed into the illness which took her to be with her God on 4 August 2023.

The full church in Arborfield for her funeral was a testimony to

the many people and organisations she had touched with love, with skill and with joy at being able to make a difference, all in the name of our Lord.


MU Gathering

Imagine travelling three or four days to get to a Mothers' Union meeting. That's what Rev. Gertrude, the president of the Kinshasa Union des Meres (MU), often has to do.

The diocese of Kinshasa is vast. On the Western end, Boma is on the Atlantic Ocean, two hundred miles from Kinshasa. Bandundu, another town in the diocese, is the same distance away in the opposite direction.

Under any circumstances, it would be a challenge to care for groups in such distant settings. What makes it even more challenging is that the transport infrastructure in the Democratic Republic of Congo is not good — and the diocese of Kinshasa doesn't have a vehicle able to negotiate the often dangerous roads. But Bishop Achille and Rev. Gertrude are not deterred: they will

travel by bus and by boat for days to be with their congregations.

The Mothers' Union in the DRC is growing. It has a rigorous training programme for new members in all its branches and undertakes many

different activities. In Kinshasa itself, the members meet regularly for prayer each Wednesday. They also, when thev have the means, undertake projects such as distributing clothing to widows. In Bandundu, the churches have been active in helping to look after people who have been displaced by conflict.

On one of his pastoral visits Bishop Achille said that it was moving to think that despite the vast distances within the diocese, we are connected by a single body of water. And we are always connected in prayer and affection. As Bishop Achille has said to us - "We are with you in our hearts".

Today almost one hundred and fifty years after its founding, we give thanks for Mothers' Union members in eighty-four countries across the world; living in a wide variety of cultural, political, and economic situations. We remember our diocesan, national and worldwide trustee boards as they work for the welfare of women, men and children and we pray for family life, for stability, equality and an end to violence and discrimination.

The diocese of Oxford is linked in the Wave of Prayer with dioceses in Africa and New Guinea and we name them now:

Kinshasa in the Democratic Republic of Congo - giving thanks for Bishop Achille and for Rosalie Etsa the first woman ordained in the diocese and praying for "Awaken" which uses Bible study to improve literacy among women. We pray for those affected by the floods in Kinshasa, and for areas suffering insecurity and displacement of people.

Ahoada and Warri in Nigeria – providing educational opportunities for children and programmes for visiting sick or elderly members of their communities.

Victoria Nyanza in Tanzania – involved in running kindergartens and nursery schools, in various agricultural and craft projects and offering pastoral support to prisoners.

Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea – training offered by the Mothers' Union in adult literacy, life skills and homeworking.

Oxford – supporting Ronald McDonald House at the John Radcliffe Hospital, Baby Basics in Milton Keynes, Children Heard and Seen, Away from it All providing holidays for families, and other local projects. All MU branches, their officers and leaders, for diocesan members, and those who continue faithful in prayer at home.

United in one faith in God our creator, redeemer and sustainer, we pray that Mothers' Union members everywhere may spread the knowledge of the love of God through their witness and service within their communities.

We reflect on some words of Jesus:

John 10. 14-16

I am the good shepherd. I know my own, and my own know me, just as the Father knows me, and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep.

I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice.

Baby Basics Milton Keynes

Thank you to everyone who has supported Baby Basics MK over the past year, whether practically or prayerfully. We supported 3711 children during 2023, including 212 Christmas "Santa Sacks" and 183 newborn kits, which is where your knitted cardigans are allocated. This is a considerable increase from the 2022 figures of 2957 children supported and 198 "Santa Sacks", and I expect the need for our services will increase once again during 2024. You contributed an amazing 368 135 toiletries and 101 knits. Christmas gifts!

The Action and Outreach Unit approved spending on changing mats



and Christmas duvet covers which are used to create bags for the Christmas gifts. Both donations were very gratefully received at our warehouse and a number of the mats have already been sent out.

As you know I am in New Zealand until the end of May but with your generous donations I was able to supply the regular 25 toiletry bags for women and 25 toiletry bags for men every month, in the form of a bumper delivery to keep them well supplied until my return. They have had the equivalent of 25 toiletry bags for both men and women for each month up to and including May this year.

However, my supplies are now getting low and as always, I need small shaving foam or gel for men, ladies' deodorant and small soaps and small tubes of toothpaste. I have found nowhere to purchase shaving foam in bulk, nor ladies' deodorant but small bars of soap can be purchased cheaply from Out of Eden. Small tubes of toothpaste can usually be supplied by local dentists so if anyone has a friendly dentist please request small tubes and either deliver to CMS House or take to the Spring Meetings in May and June. Should you require more information please feel free to email me.

Branches from South Buckinghamshire are on the list to supply items in March and April but of course I am very happy to take donations from anyone at any time.

Kelly Gillett who runs Ronald McDonald House is grateful for everything she receives from us. However, they are still pleading for packets of sanitary pads and if any branches or individual members feel they can support this request then it might be a good idea to order the products and have them delivered straight to Ronald McDonald House, Woodlands Road, Headington, Oxford OX3 7RU.

Please remember I can only take new toiletry items; please do not send in any items that have already been opened as these cannot be used. Thank you, as ever, for your kind generosity.

Safeguarding Policy

The MU Oxford board of trustees has adopted a new safeguarding policy. This is based on the national safeguarding policy produced by the MU board for Britain and Ireland.

The national policy includes the main policy and a number of more detailed appendices. Both can be accessed via this link:

Further information can be found on the MU Oxford website under safeguarding.

The general approach to safeguarding issues is unchanged but there are important differences in some of the details, which are set out here.

- 1. Every MU activity or programme must have a designated safeguarding lead. A role description is included in the document. Initially this role may be undertaken by the branch leader. It is expected that Mary Sumner House will provide some training for this role.
- 2. When starting a new activity, a risk assessment needs to be completed. A form for this is in the appendices.
- 3. If a safeguarding issue arises, a response must be made within 24 hours, or immediately if someone is in danger. The policy describes what to do and who to contact.
- 4. Trustees and other leaders will be offered safeguarding awareness training through the central Mothers' Union. More information will be available soon.

God is in the face of everyone that we meet and the fragile souls of our special needs brothers and sisters are no less part of God.

Happy Lent as we follow the footsteps of our Lord, until we praise him when Easter arrives bringing the pain and the glory of our risen Lord.
