I do hope to see as many of you as possible at Dorchester Abbey – please follow the signs that will be put out for Event Parking. Denise, our chaplain has written a prayer walk to use in the Abbey before the service which will be available from 12 noon – and please keep praying for a fine day.

From our diocesan chaplain

Dear Friends,

Your diocesan Board of Trustees met this week. We always start our meetings with a time of prayer. Over recent years that prayer time has taken the form of 'Dwelling in the Word' with which some of you may be familiar. It is a form of Lectio Divina – listening repeatedly to a passage from the bible and allowing the Holy Spirit to direct our attention to a word, a phrase or an idea provoked by what we are hearing. There then follows a time of sharing what we have heard.



This year we have been using passages from a resource based on our annual theme 'In the footsteps of Mary Sumner' and the passage we took this week was from Acts 13:

Journeying together

Now in the church at Antioch there were prophets and teachers: Barnabas, Simeon called Niger, Lucius of Cyrene, Manaen (who had been brought up with Herod the tetrarch) and Saul. While they were worshipping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, 'Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them.' So after they had fasted and prayed, they placed their hands on them and sent them off.

Some time later Paul said to Barnabas, 'Let us go back and visit the believers in all the towns where we preached the word of the Lord and see how they are doing.' Barnabas wanted to take John, also called Mark, with them, but Paul did not think it wise to take him, because he had deserted them in Pamphylia and had not continued with them in the work. They had such a sharp disagreement that they parted company. Barnabas took Mark and sailed for Cyprus, but Paul chose Silas and left, commended by the believers to the grace of the Lord. He went through Syria and Cilicia, strengthening the churches.

Acts 13:1–3;15:36–41

I was drawn to verse 3 'So after they had fasted and prayed, they placed their hands on them and sent them off' – how the gathered church prayed for and commissioned Saul (who became Paul) and Barnabas. It got me thinking about how we 'commission' our members when they are going out to do the work of Mothers' Union, whether that be knitting at home, helping to run a toddler group, gathering supplies for the hospital project or cards for prisoners, support of baptism families or parenting groups. When you are working for Mothers' Union, do you feel purposefully sent out by your branch or the group of MU members you know? Does your branch or church pray for your work?

If you do, I would love to hear more from you. If you don't, then I invite you to think about how that might happen.

Lord, be with us in all we do as we journey together along your path.
Unite us as one in vision and purpose to serve your world and glorify Christ.

Messages from our recent past Presidents

BARBARA MCGREGOR, 1983–88

I so often think of Oxford and all the happiness and excitement we all had thirty years ago. A Celebration service in Dorchester sounds wonderful. With every good wish for a Lovely Celebration and love to you all, Barbara

ROSEMARY PIERCE, 1989–94

Not having come across the Mothers' Union (MU) until I was a young mum in my mid-thirties, I appreciated their support and encouragement, and became involved locally. Attending worldwide council in 1988 as a diocesan members' representative, and meeting our link presidents from what was then Zaire (but is now the Democratic Republic of Congo), made a real impact on me, and influenced my new role as President.



I enjoyed working with our Executive team, who came with their different gifts from all parts of the diocese, with several of us benefitting from attending meetings at Mary Sumner House. It was good to be able to share the responsibility when deciding how to respond to the need for 'training and transport' in the Congo, whilst finding ways to improve communication with them and our link dioceses in rural Nigeria, and to encourage our members in local and diocesan activities.

There was a greater emphasis then on the dependency of our link dioceses upon our financial support, rather than the sense of a partnership and mutual support which we enjoy today. But there were wise women who encouraged and enabled us to learn about life for women and families at home and in other countries, and to play our part in helping them, as well as our neighbours.

The Ecumenical Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women, which started in 1988, helped members focus on how we in the Church of England might respond to issues as diverse as HIV/AIDS and the potential for the ordination of women to the priesthood. The results of local discussions were fed back to Mary Sumner House, and then the government.

Indoor Members were treasured for the prayers they offered, and

received correspondence to keep them informed. Oxford diocese made a contribution to a new international MU Anthology of Prayers, whilst Diocesan Presidents wrested with producing a new MU prayer, as well as amending our Constitution.

One special highlight in the diocese was a Prayers & Bears event for young families, held near Pangbourne, with older members helping with the children, making it an enjoyable day out.

For myself and the Chairman of our Overseas committee there was an opportunity in 1994 for a two-week visit to Boga diocese, Zaire, to meet Mothers' Union members. This was a life-changing experience for me, and is an ongoing opportunity to bring our Congolese link alive to our members. Our Membership can still challenge and support us on our Christian journey, in a world where communication is much easier for most of us today.

BARBARA TEAGUE, 1995–2000

I was Diocesan President from January 1995 having been Diocesan Treasurer for the previous six years.

During my Presidency I visited many branches, large and small, in all parts of the Diocese and gained much insight into the faith and circumstances of MU members. A highlight of my time as DP was the visit that world-wide President, Christine Eames (and myself) made to so many Oxford Deaneries and larger Branches. She spoke about her own faith and travels around the Province and listened with interest from members themselves, about their lives and their faith. One evening, at home, I was astonished to answer the telephone to a caller who announced that he was the Archbishop of Armagh! It seems that he always called his wife where-ever she stayed overnight (and that pleasure was ours) to check that all was well with her and her journey around the different dioceses.



FELICITY RANDALL, 2001–03

I was first involved with Mothers' Union in Oxford Diocese as Young Families representative and, like many YFs reps from that time, ended as Diocesan

President. Because we were to leave the diocese on my husband's retirement I was president for only three years, a time bracketed by problems – gall stone op at the start and broken ankle at the end.

In between I remember, with pleasure, individual visits to branches, passing on the 'Journey of Hope' time capsule and even planting a Mary Sumner Rose bush

Photographs bring memories of many happy events. One highlight? Perhaps a service in Westminster Abbey with the brilliant colours and music of assembled Mothers' Union members from all corners of our amazing worldwide family.

PRIMROSE GALLIMORE, 2004–09

The need for a new Diocesan President for Oxford Diocese came at a good time for me. I had just completed 25 years of working for the Citizens Advice Bureau, I was in my late fifties and I wanted something really interesting and fulfilling to do. There were not many people who wanted to be President so you could say I was appointed rather than elected, but I always felt it was an honour and I thoroughly enjoyed doing it.



I had the advantage of following Felicity who was a person of ideas so I was able to take some of them over and set them in progress. For example, our work in the John Radcliffe Hospital.

One of the best things about being President is that you get to know so many members and I soon learnt that the age of members does not decide their effectiveness. I remember going to one particular branch and, seeing how elderly they looked, I did not expect a very lively meeting. I could not have been more mistaken. By the end I realised what good work they were doing and making a real difference in their parish.

At Worldwide Conference I met members from across the globe. I remember particularly having the MU President from the Congo to stay. Neither her English or my French was very good but, with patience and a certain amount of acting, we found great interest in each other's diocese. That same year I was able to attend a Worldwide meeting in Australia where

I appreciated what a huge and important organisation the Mothers' Union is.

After my six years as President I was asked to speak to one of our branches about what the job was like. Whilst looking for a suitable title for my talk my husband suggested 'How to get nine points on your driving licence'! I certainly did do a huge amount of driving around our large diocese. If I put together the branches I visited as Action and Outreach coordinator with those I visited as President, I think I want to all, or nearly all the branches in the diocese but I found that meeting the members was what makes being President such an interesting and worthwhile job.

GILLIAN JOHNSON, 2013–15

My term in office as Diocesan President in Oxford followed a period without a DP when the diocese was led by a committee consisting of the five Area Vice Presidents. Although this worked well it did not feel so "joined up" as having a "figurehead" to whom a member could speak with either problems or praise! So began my term as your president. I was commissioned on Lady Day in Christchurch Cathedral by the new Bp of Reading, Andrew Proud, who had just taken the role as Central Chaplain to the MU.



During my incumbency we were asked to vacate our tiny Diocesan office in Christchurch Cathedral due to reorganisation there. It was with relief that we found suitable accommodation in CMS House and it was lovely that Rennie, our Diocesan Secretary, moved there too. In time Rennie retired, and we appointed Eve, who brought fresh ideas and she and her husband soon became members!

We appointed Steve Jenkins to promote the Mothers' Union and as a result to encourage growth in membership, his time in office was short, and sadly we did not realise the aim. However some branches have grown, but not sufficiently to offset the gradual decline in membership.

I worked with a very enthusiastic and encouraging team and give thanks for the prayerful support of the members, thank you for enabling me to lead the MU in Oxford diocese, and as we celebrate 130 years and give thanks let us also go forward with hope, courage and commitment.

September 20th. Emergency War Meeting of Executive

The organisation of the M.U. in the Diocese must be carried on from the office and officials and branches should keep in touch with each other and the Diocesan Office by correspondence. Mrs. Fitzwilliams Hyde, President, would try to be at the Office once a week to meet those who wished to see her. Notice of times when Office would be open to be placed in Oxford Times.

Branch work must be determined by local circumstances. Branches should be self-contained units and meetings continued. If the hall is commandeered the meeting to be in Church, with Incumbent's permission. Bishop had given permission for this to happen.

All public meetings cancelled. Triennial Elections postponed.

Owing to petrol rationing, lighting and transport restrictions, it would be impossible for Speakers to visit Branches; therefore only Speakers living near at hand to be asked.

Regular Intercessions, Services and Prayer Meetings should be arranged, and members asked to send in names of relatives and incenls on active service.

Members should be asked to do some sort of public work, such as mending, making clothes for needy evacuated women and others. Branches should co-operate with W.I.s and other organisations.

E.M.s to look up evacuated women and enquire if any belong to M.U. Every precaution to be taken before admitting evacuated members as members of M.U.

GDPR ... Again

Your Trustees have been working very hard so that we comply with the new regulations.

Branch Leaders and Correspondents should have had a conversation with a Trustee but we all have a part to play in safeguarding the personal data of our members, so please note the following:

1. If you haven't already done so, please destroy any old paper copies of personal information about MU members.
2. If you have any paper records of current MU members, these must be placed in a secure place i.e. in a locked drawer or filing cabinet.
3. Password protect your computer, phone or any other electronic device. If you do not know how to do this, please ask a friend or family member.
4. When sending emails to more than one person within Mothers' Union (and it's good practice anyway) you must use the Blind copy facility in your email browser – seen there as Bcc. If you do not know how to do this, ask someone else or email the office email and we can send you instructions.

These are important instructions. If you slip up, please report what has happened to our 'Acting' Data Protection Officer. For the meantime this is Louise Butler, whose contact details are on page 16. Louise will give advice on further action which may have to follow. The regulations tell us that we must report these mistakes very quickly so please report anything immediately!

CHANGE OF DETAILS

If you change your address, phone number or email address, please let us know us so that we can update our records. You might miss out on important communication like this magazine or the newsletter.

Branch history

MARY SUMNER AND HEDGERLEY MOTHERS' UNION

Notes from reports

Mrs Stevenson, who lived at Hedgerley Park, 'the big house' of the village and was a friend of Mary Sumner and often entertained her at Hedgerley Park, Mary Sumner often worshiped in our Parish Church.

In 1899 Mrs Stevenson held a meeting in her drawing room attended by Mary Sumner, Mrs Matthews (the vicar's wife) and Mrs Nutt, now living in Henley, who had been one of the first members enrolled in the Stoke Poges Branch which was formed in 1893. Mary Sumner spoke at this meeting explaining the Aims and Objectives, but it was not until 1901 that Hedgerley Branch was founded and registered in 1902, the subscribing members were Mrs Stevenson and Mrs Matthews, Associate Members were Mrs Bowden, Mrs Glennester (known to us as Granny Glennester), Mrs F. Glennester, Mrs Holme, Mrs Mumford and Mrs Smith.

In 1903 the vicar enrolled Mrs Stevenson, Mrs Matthews (both subscribing members) and five other ladies being Associate Members and came from all walks of life. Every member should be a worker!

25th March was generally observed as a day of prayer for the Mothers' Union, and the North Bucks President said 'more prayer needed, more faith, more zeal, more perseverance, more tact and more enthusiasm'. 239 of the 648 parishes in Oxford Diocese have a Mothers' Union.

At the Central Council Meetings, Mrs Sumner proposed increasing the subscribing member's subs to 2 shillings of which 6 pence was for the centre and 6 pence for the Diocese. The Welsh President suggested 3 pence for every member, 1 penny to branch, 1 penny to centre and 1 to Diocese.

In 1904 Oxford decided to send 10 shillings from every rural Deanery in the Diocese to central funds.

In 1907 Mrs Stevenson became PA for the Deanery and Enrolling Associate for Hedgerley, which now had 18 members. Dogmatic religious

training at monthly meetings of Associates, SMs and some EAs, should start at once, children in public houses was discussed at Central Council, all entertainment should be of a spiritual character, outings, treats and entertainments should not be planned in the name of the Mothers' Union.

An address was given at Hedgerley Park to educated mothers in the neighbourhood and in the evening to village mothers; greater care and a period of probation is needed before admitting new members and the decline in Sunday observance was discussed.

Granny Glennister, recounted how she, as a maid at Hedgerley Park, became engaged to the gardener, she was summoned to the parlour and was interviewed by Mary Sumner, who was staying at the Park. Her husband to be was also interviewed. In 1903 Granny was enrolled in Hedgerley and presented her badge by Mary Sumner who was staying at Hedgerley Park and attended the service. Granny's badge is now in the archives at Mary Sumner House and was on display at their recent celebrations.

TILEHURST

Tylehurst St George MU Branch is probably one of the older branches in the diocese, and it has an indirect link with our founder, Mary Sumner. The first branch to be formed in Reading Deanery was Beech Hill, now part of the Loddon Reach benefice in South Reading. Mary Sumner had a friend who lived there, and Mary encouraged her friend to gather the ladies of the parish together, from which a MU branch grew.

The lady at Beech Hill had a friend, an army officer's wife, whose husband was serving at Brock Barracks; the garrison church for the barracks is St George's in West Reading and from this Tylehurst St George Mothers' Union branch was formed, soon after the building of the church. We celebrated 125 years of Mothers' Union in the church a few years ago and continue as a fairly active branch with 18 members.

This lovely piece comes from the 115th celebrations, from the now-closed branch of Beech Hill (Reading deanery).

How does one start to give thanks for 115 years of Mothers Union? Over the years many enrolling members, including my own mother, have given up so much of their time to the MU. We have always understood that Mary Sumner herself came to start our branch, and in those days there was no TV, radio, cars etc, so the Mothers Union flourished, with 30 to 40 members.



One of our highlights was our 100th anniversary in 1988, when Tricia Beach ably lead us for the Deanery festival in our church, and an exhibition of 100 years of village life. The following Sunday the late Rev Peter Edwards let MU take the service when we all dressed in Victorian dress. For the festival, banners were taken into church but had to come straight out again as there were no room for them

inside! There was standing room only with some people having to stand outside. The late Rev Geoff Udall gave the address in which he called us 'the Grandmothers Union'!

We had outings to Mary Sumner House, and Old Arlesford, various gardens, and our own parties in different members' gardens over the years.

We made kneelers for our church, donated bibles for the children to use in church and we are always doing church cleaning and flower arrangement duties. In addition we have had fund-raising stalls at fetes and Christmas bazaars, selling many things there that we had made at meetings to support the church and Mothers Union. We have tried so hard to keep going and for 2 years Grazley MU has joined in all meetings, but there were not enough of us to continue.

It is with a heavy heart that I remember all of this as in 2003 we held the final meeting of Beech Hill's branch of the Mothers Union.—Dorothy Cripps

The Event Box

Financial Matters

What's happening?

In September, you will be receiving a form asking you whether you would like to begin paying for your membership by 'Direct Debit'.

Many of us already use Direct Debits to pay subscriptions and bills. They are a modern alternative to a Standing Order, which allow you to make a regular payment easily, with a pre-confirmed amount being debited from your bank account on a set date.

Following the research we did a few years ago, we have wanted to offer this service for some time. We are now being given the opportunity to be the first diocese to do so, working in partnership with Mary Sumner House (MSH). MSH will be processing your payment on our behalf. We will also need to ask you to sign another Gift Aid form, as there will be an administrative change to this process.

How will it work?

You will have the option to sign up to pay by Direct Debit online (following a link which you will find in the July–October ENewsletters), or by using the forms and prepaid envelope which you will receive through your branch (or directly if you are a Diocesan Member). It will need to be returned by **31st October 2018**.

If you sign up to pay in this way, your **2019** subscription will be taken automatically from your bank account between 15th & 20th January 2019 – you will be told the exact date and amount in advance.

Why are we doing this?

We want to make life easier for treasurers so that they don't have the huge burden of collecting your subscription and you won't have to worry about paying them. Think what else we could do with that time and energy! It will also help us in the office, particularly whilst Eve is away; receiving funds like this means we can budget more effectively. Having this modern method of payment will certainly help you attract new, younger members.

For the first year of this trial, subscriptions will be collected in full in January. If this is a success, it is hoped that in the following year we will be

able to offer monthly direct debits, allowing the annual subscription to be spread over a year, which we hope will be welcomed by both current and potential members.

Is it safe? Will it work?

Thanks to the Direct Debit Guarantee, which protects you against payments made in fraud or in error, paying via this route is now the UK's safest payment method. Details of this guarantee will be provided on the form we give you, and can also be found online.

MSH has introduced a **brand new system** to manage the collection of subscriptions by Direct Debit and we expect all to go smoothly once you have signed up.

Signing up to this initiative is by no means obligatory, but it would be really helpful if you could begin paying your subscription in this way.
