### **From our Trustees**



### Dear Friends,

How long is it since you last had a little packet of "Love Hearts" the little sherbet sweets which tingle in your mouth? For me it took me back to my primary school days as they were pocket money treats which cost just a few pence. Each member was handed a small packet as we entered the Barbican main auditorium for our annual gathering, a small gesture, given in love and welcome from MU in York diocese. many smiles and They caused immediately sparked lively conversations, both of which were features of the splendid day which followed. As a new member of the MU Oxford trustee board, when I was asked to write the trustees letter. I wondered what there would be to say; but the annual gathering included so much, it was difficult to know what to leave out. Consequently, this trustees' letter will be a bit longer than usual.

After a formal welcome from Bev Julian, CEO at Mary Sumner House, and opening prayers led by Bishop John Packer, York Provincial Chaplain, we were entertained to a fast-moving and amusing presentation from York diocese of some of their projects, including their annual involvement in a biker rally where they provide, along with other organisations, refreshments for up to 8,000 bikers! Two of the regular bikers were present, wearing their traditional leathers sporting Christian messages, as they helped on stage with the many props! The money they raise goes towards AFIA family caravan holidays.

Sheran Harper, World-wide President, was the keynote speaker. She gave a moving and informative talk about her travels on behalf of MU and highlighted just a few of the many amazing projects carried out by members in their communities. She spoke of the 500 members in Mombasa recently enrolled after 12 months of training! A project in Uganda supporting girls between the ages of 12 and 18 who are forced into child marriages, hit the media headlines after Sheran spoke of it at a provincial meeting. Another project

in South Africa involved alcoholics and the homeless - people rejected and forgotten by society but befriended and supported by MU members. She reminded us to meet people in need "where they are" and to do the same in response to declining membership. She also asked us to stand together with our diocese against gender-based violence and to support this for 365 days of the year not just 16.

Connected magazine will carry an article about our newly named campaign, "Rise up against Domestic Abuse".



The rest of the morning was spent informing us of important news and updates. I have chosen just to mention a few. Consultations are ongoing with Buckingham Palace about a new patron. We are

encouraged to use the MU app although it was admitted that the website is a challenge! A new one is promised in the year ahead along with a new database. Fund-raising and declining membership are major issues and we await new strategies for both. Income has been slowly declining over the last few years and there are serious financial issues to be addressed regarding the future of Mary Sumner House. Our structures and the way we work as a movement will have to adapt, as branches and dioceses struggle to find people to fill key roles. We all need to address

the afternoon, Bishop Emma Ineson encouraged us to bridges build between the church and the rest of the world, between our clergy and MU members, and worldwide through our projects, and to be

prepared to stand between the gutter and the stars and to look to God. "Be joyful, keep the faith, do the little things" (St David) and remember that it is at parish level where things happen.

The interactive session that followed emphasised different approaches for supporting our clergy and re-affirmed a great deal of what Bishop Emma had already mentioned. As we all know, clergy support for MU varies, but we need to keep the clergy well informed, be enthusiastic, and be prepared to get

involved with shared projects in our churches and communities and above all to have a sense of humour. Following a "call to action" from Bev Julian and Sheran Harper, the

Members filled all the seating either side of the nave, and led by the choir, we enjoyed a very special service dedicated to the work of MU. The archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell preached the sermon. reminding us of the important role of women in the ministry of our Lord and how it was women who were present at many key moments.

My husband carried our diocesan banner whilst our two young daughters and I escorted him. A young girl presented



a purse embroidered by my mother containing a donation from our diocese for AFIA. It was a special moment then to be in such a wonderful building, and it was as special again in 2023.

The next gathering will not be until 2026 when MU will be celebrating 150 years. In the meantime, we are encouraged to apply the words "Faith in Action" to everything we do and to continue the vision of Mary Sumner.

laughter of members of my very large family in the other rooms, I would be quite happy to slip inside the back door and stand by the sink, washing or drying up with my mum and other people we loved, sharing family stories while some put the kettle on the gas stove for yet another round of tea or cut up slices of homemade cake to arrange on the best china plates. Comfortable in the kitchen of God's house, with my family around. That is where I would like to be. How about you?

Primrose Mary Gallimore (nee Wallace) 2 April 1939 – 25 May 2023



Primrose Gallimore was for fifty years one of the cornerstones of village life in Stewkley. An active and constant member of the congregation of St Michael and All Angels church, and for a time a member of the Parochial Church Council, she combined this with local and regional leadership of The Mothers' Union.

Church was always important to Primrose. Her mother, who died in 1968, had been branch leader of her local Mothers' Union in Kent. This inspired Primrose to take

on the leadership of the Stewkley branch during the 1990's eventually she served as Oxford Diocesan President from 2004-2009. In 2009 she participated in a Mothers' worldwide Union conference in Australia. Most delegates to this conference were accompanied by their husbands, but when John Gallimore discovered that the Australian authorities would not allow him to bring snuff into the country, he decided he could not possibly go and SO Primrose. undaunted. went on her Primrose became an advisor at the Citizens Advice Bureau in Leighton Buzzard; she was a welcomer at Christ Church Cathedral in Oxford; and a volunteer visitor at HMP Grendon.

Those who knew Primrose will remember a determined, energetic lady, totally committed to the causes that she championed. Mothers' Union in the Oxford diocese will always be grateful for everything she gave to our organisation and our members.

### **Mission Unlimited**

In May 2022 the Trustees announced the launch of the Diocesan Projects Fund, to which members can apply for help to fund activities within their churches and communities, which qualify under the terms of our charity aims and objectives. One of the first of these projects to receive a grant from the fund is 'Dignity through Dressmaking' which trains people in dressmaking skills, giving them an initial income and establishing them with a future work skill. Those of you who were able to come to our annual meeting at Benson in October will have seen their display.

About twelve years ago, Central MU launched a referendum to explore changing the overarching charity name. One of the suggestions was 'Mission Unlimited', which describes our work very well. However, there was strong resistance overseas to making any name change.

In Oxford diocese, we have decided to adopt the 'Mission Unlimited' name for awards made from our Diocesan Projects Fund, to raise the profile of Mothers' Union within our churches and communities whilst keeping our traditional name.

'Mission Unlimited awards' can be applied for by any diocesan or branch member to support any project within your church or community for which the applicant acts as a champion. Full details of the application process are on the MU Oxford website under 'Diocesan Project Fund'.

# Autumn Meeting and AGM

It's early October, the sun is shining and we are gathering again at Benson village hall so it must be the autumn meeting and AGM. It really is amazing how quickly the year has gone and how much has happened.

The colourful displays showcasing our work had been refreshed. Not only Baby Basics and Children Heard and Seen, the regular MUe stall and Memorial Book: but also our first Mission Unlimited award being used to help fund work asylum with seekers and display additional showing the entrants to the Noticeboard Challenge. The winner of the challenge was announced Abingdon and Elizabeth Dawson received their prize on behalf of the branch. We will be running the challenge again next year and we hope the entries will give you all ideas for your own noticeboards and help to raise our profile in church and local communities.

Tricia Campbell chaired our meeting and after opening prayers, provided by members of Abingdon branch, she handed over to Louise Butler to chair the AGM. We accepted the annual report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2022; and agreed to the appointment of an independent

Louise also announced that subscriptions for the coming year would remain unchanged because MU in the Oxford diocese have decided to absorb the increase in subscriptions made by Mary Sumner House.

The AGM was followed by a short summary of the annual gathering from Val Bolan. Then our guest speaker, Kelly Gillett, who is the manager of Ronald McDonald House Oxford, told us about the work they do to support the families of babies and children in the John Radcliffe Hospital. Kelly explained that they get no government funding and are totally dependent on support from organisations like McDonalds and Mothers' Union. The gifts of kitchen supplies and toiletries which we provide are invaluable and she thanked us most sincerely and said that we are welcome to visit to see the House and the work they do. She left with a pack of knitted hats for premature babies.

Unit Coordinators spoke about their reports took and questions, and a survey was circulated to gather views about the organising of the spring meetings. The results of this survey will be used to help the trustees decide how best to organise spring meetings in the future. Midday prayers were led by Rev. Lady Denise Brown. During the break we enjoyed our packed lunches, browsed the displays and visited the MUe stall.

In the afternoon, Rev. Mary Harwood, our MU chaplain, presided over a service of Holy Eucharist. There was a retiring collection which raised £377.05 for our diocesan Action and Outreach projects.

When we emerged at the end of the service, the sun was still shining and it sped us on our way back home with a spring in our step, smiles on our faces and fond memories of our time together.

I have had a plea from her recently that they would like packets of sanitary pads and if any branches, or members/diocesan members feel they can support this request then it might be a good idea to order the products and have them delivered straight to Ronald McDonald House, Woodlands Road, Headington, Oxford OX3 7RU.

We always need men's shaving foam or gel and also ladies' deodorant. Other items can be ordered in bulk from Amazon or Out

of Eden and sent direct to CMS House, Watlington Road, Oxford OX4 6BZ for me to collect on a regular basis.

The next branches on the list to provide toiletries are Wash Common, Windsor, Wokingham All Saints and Wokingham St Paul, but of course any contributions are always acceptable at any time.
